- 1.Close the gender pay gap
- 2. Passage of the ERA by the NC Legislature
- 3. Voting Rights
- 4.Increase the involvement of the Asheville AAUW Branch members to address public policy issues that affect women and girls thru greater participation in advocacy

Betsy Kirk and Anne Sayers have met with the Program Planning Committee for the coming year to discuss ideas for program topics related to public policy and advocacy. Anne will continue to participate in the YWCA Advocacy Committee as well as the United Way Voter Engagement Coalition. Betsy will work on plans to acknowledge Equal Pay Day in April. The group will meet again in April to further plan for ways to address these priorities.

EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT MOVING ACROSS NATION AND IN NC



The Equal Rights Amendment, long considered a dead issue, is alive and kicking now. For the first time since 1982, the North Carolina General Assembly will consider the ERA this year. Rep. Carla Cunningham of Charlotte has introduced House Bill 166,

which now has four primary sponsors and 28 cosponsors—in all, nearly a third of the House members. All the Buncombe County House members (Susan Fisher, John Ager, and Brian Turner) have signed onto the bill, which has been referred to House Judiciary 1 Committee. Senators Floyd McKissick and Terry Van Duyn have introduced a similar measure, Senate Bill 184, which now has two cosponsors. It has been assigned to the Senate Rules Committee, which is not considered friendly to the legislation (an understatement).

An excellent front-page article in the Asheville Citizen-Times recently highlighted current North Carolina ef-

The Equal Rights Amendment, long consid- forts to enshrine gender equality in the U.S. Constitution.

The national ERA Coalition, recently organized, sponsored a major ERA rally in Washington last fall. The event drew women from more than 30 states, including North Carolina. Meanwhile legislation to ratify the amendment is moving in Illinois, Virginia, Florida, North Carolina, and Nevada. The AAUW has been active in the national effort to persuade Congress to eliminate the deadline and is also working in several states for ratification.

Two statewide organizations, *RATIFY ERA-NC* and NC4ERA, are working together in support of the congressional legislation to eliminate the deadline, as well as grassroots efforts to build support in our General Assembly. \$TART \$MART WORKSHOP SCHEDULED

Our AAUW branch along with the YWCA, Just Economics, and OnTrack Women's Financial Empowerment Center are co-sponsoring a \$tart \$mart workshop to be held on April 14th, 2015, which is Equal Pay Day. Equal Pay Day is the day when women's salaries finally equal those earned by men on December 31st of the previous year.

This workshop is designed to target women who are under-employed and underpaid and who are eligible for jobs that require either a high school diploma with some experience or an AA degree.

The goal of this three hour workshop is to help participants learn to negotiate their highest possible salary. They will also learn tools for how to develop a personal budget to determine salary needs as well as discover the benchmarks for salary and benefits in their field. All attendees will receive a copy of AAUW's *The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap*, 2015 edition. There is no charge to attend the workshop. Lunch will be provided and limited child care will be available upon request.
