In our county, "1 out of 4 children…is living in poverty." After Greg's talk, a new member told me how glad she was to learn of AAUW's interest in this kind of work. ## **AAUW ASHEVILLE 100TH YEAR HISTORY**

A group of 17 young women college graduates met in Boston in the fall of 1881 to discuss restrictions against the education, growth, and development of women. They formed a national alumnae association of women representing Boston University, Cornell University, Oberlin, Smith, Vassar and Wellesley Colleges, and the University of Michigan and Wisconsin. The Southern Association of College Women later organized in 1903 in Knoxville, TN. These two organizations merged at a meeting held in Washington, DC in April of 1921 to become the American Association of University Women.

The Asheville branch of the AAUW can trace it's history from March 27th, 1915, when 16 female college graduates in the community met and organized the "Western Carolina Branch of the Southern Association of College Women". In their first year another 12 women joined, for a total of 28 members. In 1939 the name was changed to the Asheville Branch of the American Association of University Women.

From the beginning the Branch tackled community projects. In 1919, when businessmen were trying to make Asheville a convention city, the AAUW members contributed \$5 each and worked successfully to bring the national convention of the Federation of Women's Clubs to Asheville. Community work centered on helping the Salvation Army, support for Travelers Aid, and visiting patients in the local sanitariums. Other projects included working to improve standards in colleges for women, to establish night schools, to help set up a juvenile court system, and to improve the probation system. They hit the ground running with their new organization.

#### **NEW ERA SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP**
