FROM THE BRANCH PRESIDENT

Dear AAUW Friends,

It was a snowy day, almost unheard of weather in Georgia, when my young son and I traveled 200 miles to Atlanta and marched with hundreds of others to the state capitol in support of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). That was over 30 years ago. Where does the ERA stand now?

The ERA was first introduced in Congress in 1923, then reintroduced every year until its passage in 1972. By the time the final deadline passed in 1982, 35 states had approved the ERA, three states short of ratification. For the first time since 1982, the ERA was introduced in the NC General Assembly this year where it remains stuck in the Senate Rules Committee. More than half of American citizens (women) still do not have constitutionally guaranteed equality.

AAUW is committed to passage and ratification of the ERA. Campaigns are active in several states, and Ratify ERA-NC is working to promote grassroots advocacy for ratification. Find out what YOU can do to support equality for women. 92 years is long enough.
