We held our annual Friendraiser on December 10th at 10,000 Villages, had a great turnout, and raised money for GEM as a bonus. Sixty-three attended our December function including more than 10 guests. We had food, wine and cider provided by Anne Gibson, a former AB Tech Culinary School Graduate and one of the GEM fund scholars. It was delightful, and our thanks and praise go to Anne for doing such a wonderful job.

We have received a \$342 check for the GEM fund from 10,000 Villages as a result of the 15% pledge of proceeds towards our non-profit. The manager told me this was one of the largest checks they've ever written! That means that our members spent approximately \$2300 in the store! Of course, 10,000 Villages wants us to return in 2016. We also collected 2 boxes of books for the Swannanoa Prison program. It was an all-around success.
