A RADICAL IDEA: EQUALITY FOR WOMEN

The Equal Rights Amendment, written 91 years ago and believed dead in 1982 when the congressionally imposed deadline ran out, is alive and Senator Kay Hagan is one of 34 well. The ERA has been a priority for AAUW-NC, which contributed \$500 to **RATIFY ERA-NC last year to support** the fledgling movement in our state. Bipartisan legislation to eliminate the deadline and make ERA part of the U.S. Constitution after three more states ratify is pending in Congress: SJR 15 and HJR 113. The Senate

measure, featured in a recent briefing, is expected to be heard in the Judiciary Committee soon. co-sponsors. The House version replaces HJR 43, which was withdrawn when its author resigned from the House. Rep. Jackie Speier of California then introduced HJR 113, which has already attracted 111 co-sponsors.

Action Needed: Please call Senator Burr, who has not yet signed on as a co-sponsor, and your respective member of the U.S. House of

Representatives and urge them to cosponsor this legislation. It's a toll free call to the U.S. Capitol: 1-877-762-8762. Just ask for the office of Senator Burr and then of your Representative in the House. Women have waited too long. It is way past time for full equality to be guaranteed by our Constitution.



Last month our branch formed a new interest group — "AAUW

Upstreamers" - formed in conjunction with RiverLink of Asheville; whose director, Karen Cragnolin, gave us a spirited, inspiring talk at the March branch meeting regarding RiverLink, an organization dedicated to the ecologically sound and userfriendly maintenance of the French Broad and its tributaries.

Group leader Barbara Robinson describes the new group as a Level 2 volunteer group who will do three clean-ups a year of their designated stream, Beaverdam Creek, as well as monitoring the water level and quality. Twenty-two members have joined the group, so far, and Barbara says the group is open to any member who's "willing to get her feet wet, her hands dirty (in gloves, however!), and enjoys being outdoors." They meet three times a year on dates chosen by the group in early spring. Their first work day occurred, appropriately, on Earth Day, April 22.

Of this event, Barbara writes:

Ladies---We were an intrepid band of 7 today, and filled up 11 bags of trash----plus assorted goodies such as old hoses, car parts, & blobs of carpet. AND----we resembled goats in our climbing abilities, hanging onto roots, rocks and each other. But it was a pretty day, and I personally came home smiling & feeling gratified about


my good deed for Mother Earth. I hope my 6 BFF today did too.

Some lessons learned-----wear rubber boots or old sneakers with good treads 'cause you'll probably get your feet wet, and have to climb up hill & down dale! RiverLink provided picker-uppers which were very handy, but Iris & Eleanor had a long-handled garden tool with a pick on the end that came in very handy. The creek isn't very wide or deep, & the water is clear, but the fallen trees, shrubs, & vines made it challenging to get to the actual creek bed. We worked about 2 hours today, and with all the climbing & hauling bags that we did, that seemed like a good period of time. We walked the road downstream a ways & the land we'll do in July is flatter and almost park-like in appearance (never mind the trash in the creek!).

As an added inducement for additional volunteers in July----there's a beach ball, fully inflated, waiting for the lucky woman who wades into the water for it! Or, if you'd prefer, there's also an orange street sign in the creek.

So look at your calendars & hopefully we can come up with another intrepid --- and larger--- band July 15th or 17th. Many hands make light work, as our Moms always said.
