### **News from the Membership Committee**

It is May! Please renew your membership to AAUW for the 2016-2017 year. Definitely renew before June 30th to be included within our directory! Membership renewal includes the following dues: \$73. The breakdown of the dues for one year is \$49.00 to National, \$11.00 to State and \$13.00 to our branch! Remember **\$46.00** is tax deductible. Dues for Life Members are \$24.00. This year you might want to add a little donation when you renew. There is an endowment fund to honor the late Ann Chipley, past president of AAUW North Carolina. She was devoted to issues of equity for women, serving AAUW as a staff member for nearly ten years, initially serving as the director of the Program and Public Policy Department and ending as a member of the AAUW senior staff. This fund is to support post graduate studies for NC women. It was set up in 1996 with the goal of \$100,000 but will "expire" this year unless we, AAUW NC, complete the fund with an additional \$9,000. If we cannot do this, then the money will be turned into general scholarships and not be specifically designated for North Carolina. The deadline is May 30, 2017. When you register on line, you can help us keep this endowment fund!

Asheville Area Habitat builds one WB house a year. This year, the volunteer calendar for the house starts in May and ends in July. We are proposing that an AAUW group volunteer for one day this year. # **CHRISTI WHITWORTH IS OUR SPEAKER FOR MAY**

Christi Whitworth, the education director for the Pisgah Astronomical Research Institute (PARI), will be the featured speaker at the AAUW branch meeting.


Whitworth has been instrumental in having PARI designated not only as the <u>North Carolina</u> host of the National Girls Collaborative Project (with which AAUW has long been associated) but also as one of only 10 "museums" in the country (and the only one in <u>North Carolina</u>) to host the popular PBS initiated SciGirls program.

While the National Girls Collaborative Project aims to bring together providers of STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) programs with organizations seeking STEM activities for girls, the SciGirls program targets girls ages 9-14 with monthly programming on a variety of topics. Sci-Girls programs are open to all area girls; no prior participation in Sci-Girls is required.

After being developed as a NASA tracking station in 1963 (October marked its 50th anniversary) and then evolving into a Department of Defense center for satellite data collection, PARI is now a not-for-profit foundation dedicated to providing hands-on educational and research opportunities for a broad cross-section of users in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) disciplines. Besides the programs targeted toward girls, Whitworth manages other educational programs and research activities geared towards high school and college students and teachers, often in collaboration with scientific professionals.
