# ADVOCACY/PUBLIC POLICY ACTS TO SUPPORT WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Lack of access to affordable health care continues to be a major issue for low income women and children in North Carolina. To address this need, "Carolina Cares" has been introduced in the NC House by three Representatives . House Bill 662, will take advantage of the continuing opportunity to expand Medicaid while adapting it to a program they feel will be acceptable to NC and address the need for greater insurance coverage for those this who are not now insured. Please contact Representative Susan Fisher, Brian Turner and John Ager and express your support for this import bill.

Our committee continues to work to increase funding for child care vouchers for low income families. We are pleased that the Governors budget and new legislation both request increased funds that will benefit Buncombe families.

AAUW was in the room where it happened:

**Pilot of the AAUW Salary Negotiations program called Start Smart** was held on April 19 at UNC-A. Eighteen students attended the session.

The four strategies of negotiation are:

- -Know Your Value
- -Benchmark Your Salary and Benefits
- -Know Your Strategy
- -Practice, Practice!

A highlight of the session was having the students pair up and practice negotiating a salary. The session was facilitated by AAUW National Start Smart Program Manager, Dorrie Sieburg. Our branch is so fortunate that Dorrie lives in Asheville and was willing to facilitate the program.

We partnered with the UNC-A Career Center and Student Affairs to bring this program to UNC-A. Our thanks to Marlane Mowitz, Chris Hegg and David Earnhardt from the Career Center for their support in attending the session.

Feedback from the students was positive. All said they were very likely to use the skills they learned. One big aha was, it is okay to negotiate a salary!




