Celeste Collins from OnTrack Financial, a nonprofit serving low income people, especially women, helps with financial counseling such as home buying, tax preparation, budgeting for goals, and avoiding foreclosure, among other services. Jane Hatley, the Western NC Regional Director of Self-Help Credit Union, graduated from Vanderbilt with a full scholarship from AAUW! Her organization provides services to low income and rural families and women, from loans and banking services with low rates, child care training, loans to women who own businesses, and energy efficiency lending, among other services. Jenny Eblen, whose family goes back for generations in our community, discussed five different organizations that she finds worthy of her support:

 Women for Women: pools their resources and disperses security grants.

- Smart Start: provides money for child care across North Carolina
- YWCA: supporting women with child care and other services
- ♦ Mt. Airy: Early learning center
- Girl Scouts: Leadership development

I am also happy to report that we have two newly formed groups: an advocacy group, led by Ruth Slawson, and a writing group, led by Betty Paine. Ruth's group has decided to focus on support for voting for all and Betty's group, made up of six members, will share and critique their short stories and memoirs.

Recently, America learned that women are <u>still paid 23 cents less</u> than men are — the same pay gap we were facing a decade ago. Check out <u>your state's rank</u> in the 2012 census data. Use this information as a springboard to engage in conversation with friends, colleagues, and potential AAUW members. You can also use your social media outlets to share AAUW messaging on the issue of unequal pay. Making connections through critical issues is a great recruitment and retention tool, helping us all build a community that empowers women and girls. Be a membership ambassador: Engage new and potential members so that we create a lasting AAUW legacy.

Median earnings for men in North Carolina were \$41,859 compared to women's median earnings of \$34,421 an earnings ratio of just 82 percent.
