GEM News

In October, the GEM Board voted to raise the number of scholarships for the 2015-16 academic year to a record 18: is a great way to raise money for scholarships, while, at 16 \$1000 scholarships for A-B Tech and two \$2000 scholar- the same time, honoring friends and family. Watch for ships for UNCA. Only 12 years ago, our Asheville branch founded the GEM Fund which awarded that year a single scholarship of \$500. The success of the GEM Fund is due entirely to the generosity of our Asheville branch members and family.

The fall edition of "GEM Chips," the bi-annual newsletter of the GEM Fund of AAUW Asheville, will be out soon. The newsletter will include a summary of the annual report, as well as details and pictures from last spring's fund drive season, lists of donors, and the announcement of our 15 scholarship recipients for 2014-15.

Meanwhile, Jeanne Smolkin's GEM "Birthday Dollars for Scholars" program remains in full force. In the first eight

months of 2014, the program brought in over \$6,000. This Jeanne's monthly e-mail containing the link to the site where you can designate birthday honorees.

If you are a new member, please know that "GEM" stands for "Gaining Educational Momentum" and pertains to our branch's unique philanthropic arm, whose sole purpose is to raise funds to support undergraduate scholarships for women whose educations have been interrupted or delayed.

YWCA DROP IN DAY CARE (PART II)

AAUW has supported this effort over the past few years providing volunteer assistance as well as funds for supplies and snacks. More volunteers are needed to help with the children—it will be worth every minute you spend there.

Jammie Wright was stuck. A single mom with three children, she was working full-time towards a Surgical Tech Certificate at A-B Tech so that she would have more employment opportunities. Yet she didn't have the resources for full-time childcare, and was on the waiting list to receive a state child care voucher. Her two high school-aged daughters were missing school because they had to help care for Jammie's infant daughter, Tiraji, while she attended classes.

Jammie is just one of thousands of parents in Buncombe County who are seeking to build skills, secure benefits, or seek employment - yet are challenged by a lack of affordable child care. The cost of full-time child care in Buncombe County averages at a whopping \$7,280 a year. While state-funded child care subsidies are available for those who fall within a certain income range, subsidies are only available if the parent is working full time. Thus, many parents find themselves in a catch 22; they can't apply for a childcare voucher without a job, and they can't apply for a job without childcare. Other parents like Jammie qualify for a voucher but end up on the waiting list for years.

Fortunately, A-B Tech told Jammie about the YWCA's Drop-In Child Care Center, which offers case assistance and high quality child care at no cost to families seeking economic security by pursuing education, job training or accessing vital social services like Work First, substance abuse treatment, or legal matters. Childcare is available 58 hours per week, Monday through Friday, and parents like Jammie are able to access up to 12 hours of free child-care per week .

Jammie's daughter Tiraji was cared for at the YWCA from the time that she was 4 months until she was 10 months old – allowing Jammie and her two older daughters to focus on their education. At the end of April 2013, after two years on the waiting list, Jammie began receiving child care vouchers, so Tiraji could now attend a full-time certified child care center. Jammie graduated with a certificate in June, 2013 and she's now pursuing a Medical Assistant Associate Degree. "I wouldn't have been able to further my education if not for Drop-In at the YWCA," Jammie says. "I can't thank them enough for all the help and support. My family is very grateful."
