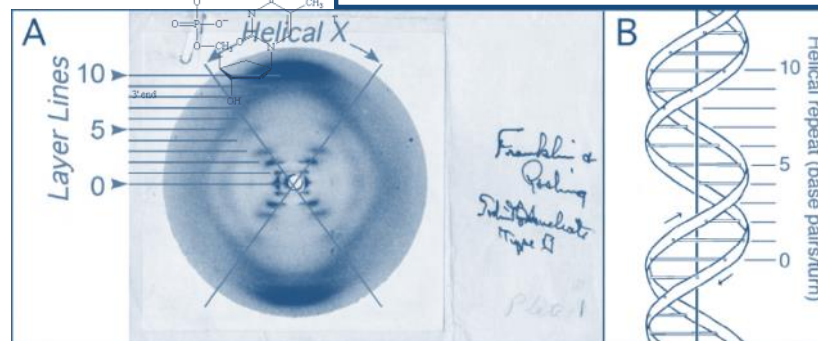

British chemist **Rosalind Franklin** is best known for her role in the discovery of the structure of DNA, and for her pioneering use of X-ray diffraction. Without Franklin's permission or knowledge her Photo 51 was shown to competing scientist James Watson, who was working on his own DNA model with Francis Crick at Cambridge. Crick and Watson used what they saw in Photo 51 as the basis for their famous model of DNA, for which they received a Nobel Prize in 1962.

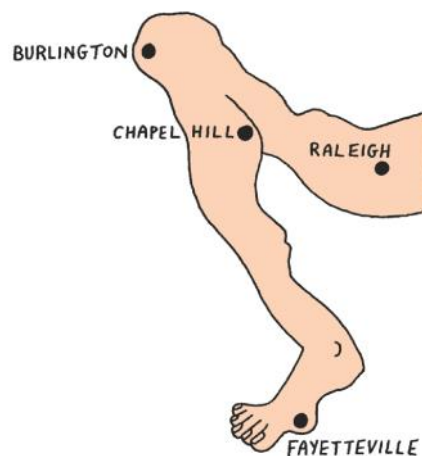
Our group is up and running for the year! We have welcomed five new members -- and others have expressed interest in our A/PP Committee. We have chosen four issues as our focus for the year after surveying our members. They are:

- Healthcare - ACA, CHIP (Children's Health Insurance Program), Community Health Center Funding, and Medicare
- Early Care and Education
- Equal Rights for Women - ER Amendment and Fair Wage/Pay Gap
- Stand Against Gerrymandering

A/PP will meet the 2nd Friday, November 10 at 9:30 am at the YWCA -- 85 S. French Broad Avenue. We welcome any AAUW members who want to work on these important policy areas.

New News: Why Was Gerrymandering Added to the A/PP Focus Issues?

There are two reasons: 1. Because gerrymandering is currently in courts in NC and 2. There is currently no US law to disallow the drawing of electoral districts to unfairly favor one political party over another. Six states already have non-partisan methods for drawing districts, but not North Carolina. By comparison, when you Google "gerrymandering", North Carolina is the first example given of extreme gerrymandering! -- by race and party.

The A/PP committee felt that we needed to focus on educating AAUW membership on this timely matter and identify actions that we can take to support other groups who are advocating a non-partisan approach for North Carolina. Common Cause, Democracy NC and the League of Women Voters (all non-partisan organizations) are actively supporting non-partisan electoral *and* judicial districts.

Watch for: A lawsuit in the US District Court for the Middle District of North Carolina called Common Cause v. Rucho is currently being heard. Basically, the court is being asked to decide if the legislative districts in NC are unfairly drawn in what amounts to partisan gerrymandering. Another case from Wisconsin, Gill v. Whitford, also deals with partisan gerrymandering. This case is being considered by the US Supreme Court this term.

If you'd like to "stand against gerrymandering", join the League's "Reclaim Your Vote" **5K Walk/Run on November 4 at 1 pm** in West Asheville along the line that divides Congressional Districts 11 & 10.

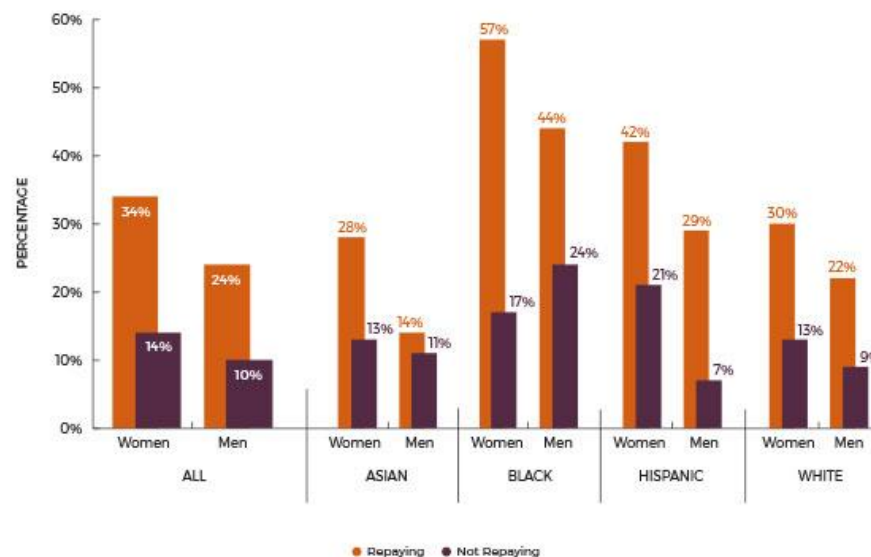
