

As announced last month by new GEM Board President LaDean Peterson, the fiscal year 2013-14 was a great year for the GEM Fund of AAUW Asheville. Thanks to the enormous generosity of branch members and friends, GEM raised almost \$45,000 last year, including the annual spring fund drive, which brought in over \$20,000. FROM THE ADVOCACY GROUP

The **Advocacy Group of the Asheville AAUW** Branch would like you to know about the many activities we have underway in October and early November as we all prepare for the November mid-term election. AAUW will be co-sponsor, along with other community partners, a Candidate Forum with panelists running for the NC Senate and House, and the statewide judicial races. This will be held at the Wesley Grant Center on October 9th from 6 to 8 pm. More details will be provided in the near future. We will again hold a workshop for "Outside Poll Monitors" to be led by Democracy North Carolina on Saturday, October 11 from 11 to 2 at the YWCA. We are also a co-sponsor for a Voter Guide that will be published by Mountain Express and widely available.

We continue to do voter registration with the YWCA and will be registering voters at the Council on Aging Dining sites that have requested help from community volunteers. We are supporting the "I Pledge to Vote" Campaign being led by the United Way, so look forward to receiving an email giving you the opportunity to commit to vote.

YWCA Drop In Day Care (Part I)

AAUW has supported this effort over the past few years providing volunteer assistance as well as funds for supplies and snacks. More volunteers are needed to help with the children—it will be worth every minute you spend there.

The YWCA's Drop-In Child Care Center, offers case assistance and high quality child care at no cost to families seeking economic security by pursuing education, job training or accessing vital social services like Work First, substance abuse treatment, or legal matters. Childcare is available 58 hours per week, Monday through Friday, and parents are able to access up to 12 hours of free child-care per week.

In order to help families navigate systems to improve their circumstances Drop-In staff assists clients through the following process:

- 1. Intake and verification
- 2. Goal Setting and one-on-one with Program Coordinator
- 3 .Information and Referral as needed
- 4. Progress check in/elimination of barriers
- 5. Achievement of goal or reset new goals

Staff also tracks participants' progress towards their goals through follow-up calls and one-on-one meetings.

Over the past three years, the YW has helped 531 families improve economic security. Of those families, 40 secured full time jobs, 95 secured part-time jobs, 22 persons with disabilities secured benefits, 21 enrolled in a four year college, 121 enrolled in community colleges or vocational training, and 40 obtained other training. Further, the Center provided 1,000 children with 15,000 hours of quality care while their parents worked to improve their family's economic situation.
