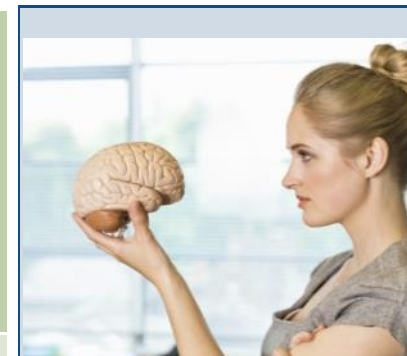

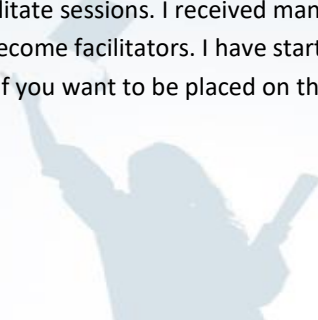
Committee News

"We the People" Constitutional Study Hosted by League of Women Voters

Co-sponsored by AAUW

(October 3, 10, 17, 24; November 7, 14)

The history and contemporary role of the Constitution of the United States will be the focus of a "We the People" fall study program organized by the League of Women Voters of Asheville-Buncombe County, bringing the principles of this country's founding document forward into 2017.

The six-weeks study will examine such vital contemporary topics as freedom of speech, the right to assemble, executive power, voting rights, and procedural due process. It will also include discussion of judicial interpretation and the continuing impacts of key Supreme Court decisions.

The presentations (with discussion) will be led by Bruce Elmore, Jr., a native of Asheville whose legal career began by watching his first jury trial when he was 10, and starting work in his father's Asheville law office (Bruce Elmore Sr.) when he was 14. A graduate of the University of North Carolina School of Law, Elmore is a former president of the North Carolina Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union and current vice president of the NC ACLU Legal Foundation.

Organized by the local LWV, the study course is being co-sponsored by additional nonprofit, nonpartisan organizations including AAUW Asheville, YWCA of Asheville, and the Western NC Chapter of the ACLU of NC.

Sessions will be held at the YWCA of Asheville, 185 S. French Broad Ave., on Tuesdays from 7 to 8:30 on October 3, 10, 17, 24 and November 7, 14. The course is free to the public; to reserve a space, send name and email address (or phone number) to We.people.us@gmail.com, with the word RESERVATION in the subject line.

The list of Dinners for International Dining is almost complete and it looks to be exciting, unique and, as always, delicious!

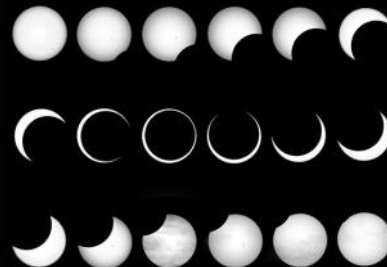

Maria Mitchell (1818-1889) was the first American woman to work as a professional astronomer. In 1865 Mitchell became a faculty member at Vassar College, making her the first female astronomy professor in the United States. She was also appointed director of Vassar College Observatory. After teaching there for some time, she learned that despite her reputation and experience, her salary was less than that of many younger male professors. She insisted on a salary increase, and got it. In 1878, she and several students traveled two thousand miles to Colorado to witness a total solar eclipse.

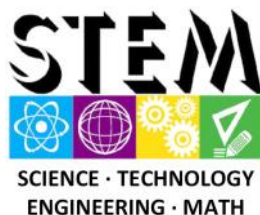
