Often time-sensitive appeals to lawmakers are needed *after* the AAUW Newsletter goes to print – so Leslie Talbott developed the **PPP**. We'll also use this flexible format to offer a more in-depth look beneath the headlines to prepare us to be **"5-Minute Activists"**.

Please allow a couple of months to test drive the new tool – and tell us what you think. Later we'll offer an "unsubscribe" button, but please give it a chance! Join us for our next meeting (December 8 at 9:30-11:00 am at the YWCA), as we discuss these 4 issues:

Healthcare --- Affordable, Available, Equitable

Every month, another healthcare idea emerges on The Hill. Now it's the tax bills. As passed by the House, key tenets will profoundly reverse healthcare progress. In December, a Senate tax bill may need a call to action, so be watching the news for Senate action. We'll break it down in the **Public Policy Primer** and ask you to be a 5-minute activist. Meanwhile, tell everyone, that the Affordable Care Act is OPEN for enrollment, but only till December 15. For expert help, folks can **call Pisgah Legal Services at 855-733-3711.**

Gerrymandering --- Undemocratic, Unfair, Unsustainable

Hats off to the League of Women Voters for sponsoring a 5K Run/Walk in West Asheville. Walkers followed a bizarre route that ran precisely on the line dividing US Congressional Districts 11 and 10. It was a clever way to draw attention to a gerrymandered, crazy line. Over 300 walkers/runners got it! Gerrymandering means voters can't choose their Representatives. Computer programs mean *law*makers choose their voters instead. Across NC, districts are cracked or packed – what's that? Find out in December's PPP!

Early Childhood Education --- New Steps Towards Good Early Care for All

Buncombe County is on the move to help all very young children get the care and learning they deserve. A large, influential community group, **Asheville Buncombe Preschool Planning Collaborative**, has met for many months, studying possibilities and costs to expand and pay for education for 0 to 4 year olds. ERA and More: Women's Right to Fair Pay AND Fair Treatment

We roundly condemn the thousands of stories of sexual harassment and abuse that are coming to light these days, pointing up the myriad ways women are treated *less than* their male counterparts. Too often men use powerful positions to subdue and manipulate women – and worse. And those victims cannot breach the system in corporate/entertainment/government structures. Laws and legal recourse matter! The ERA promises change for equal pay – and more, even for sexual abuse.

AAUW celebrates 132 year Birthday On November 28!

How many organizations can say they have lasted for as long as we have? The answer is, not many. Let's back up. Our story always begins in 1881 with Marion Talbot, a then-recent graduate from Boston University, and Ellen Swallow Richards, Talbot's mentor and also the first woman professor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. On November 28, 1881, they invited 15 alumnae from eight colleges to a meeting in Boston. Out of this meeting, they created the idea for the Association of Collegiate Alumnae, which would become AAUW. The plan was to join together to help other women attend college and to assist those who had already graduated. On January 14, 1882, a group of 65 college women graduates met and officially formed the Association of Collegiate Alumnae to "unite in practical educational work." The rest is history, right? Well, we've uncovered some "new" history this year. For years, we thought we know all we could know

about our founder, Marion Talbot. We recognized her young face in our photos (she always seemed to be in her cap and gown!) We knew her mother, Emily Talbot, was disappointed at the lack of professional and social opportunities available to women like her daughter. We knew she went on to become dean of women at the University of Chicago and worked to improve educational opportunities for women throughout

her life.
