Barriers to STEM careers for women

- Stereotypes
- Unconscious bias
- Lack of female role models and mentors

In the US more than half the undergraduate students who declare a STEM major in their freshman year do not graduate with a STEM degree. About 75% of undergraduate minority students leave their STEM major for a different field of study.

Often a combination of factors, including stereotypes, unconscious bias, and a lack of female role models and teachers discourages girls' interest in these fields. The clothes we wear, the toys we are given, the gender roles we are encouraged to fill, may all implicitly or directly tell our girls they do not have the intellectual capacity or ability to pursue their interest in STEM fields.

AAUW has long supported women by investing in their education and has a long

and distinguished history of advancing educational and professional opportunities for women in the United States and around the globe.

Through research, campus initiatives and STEM education and public policy involvement AAUW breaks through barriers so that all women have a fair chance.



Women in S.T.E.M.

Do you often think about hyperbolic geometry while crocheting?

Margaret Wertheim studied mathematics and physics at university in Australia. She and her twin sister Christine founded The Institute for Figuring, an organization dedicated to the poetic and aesthetic dimensions of science, mathematics and

engineering. The sisters developed the Crochet Coral Reef, "a project that invites participants to crochet hyperbolic coral forms that are massed into vast reef-like installations." The basic process for making the crochet coral reef is a simple pattern or algorithm, which on its own produces a mathematically pure shape. By varying or mutating this algorithm, endless variations and permutations of shape and form can be produced. "It turns out that hyperbolic structures are very common in nature, and the place where lots of people encounter them is coral reefs," says Margaret Wertheim. "Sea slugs, and a lot of other organisms with frilly forms, are biological manifestations of hyperbolic geometry, which is also found in the structure of lettuce leaves and kales, and some species of cactus." Who knew?



GEM Increases Both Number and Amount of Scholarships

Thanks to the generous contributions of our members, AAUW-Asheville's GEM Fund has grown significantly. In 2002, our first year, we were able to award only a modest two scholarships for \$500 each, but in 2017 we awarded 25 scholarships totaling \$27,500. To date, we have awarded a total of \$140,371 to AB-Tech and UNCA students. There are now 110 women who are GEM-AAUW Scholars. Through these scholarships, we improved the lifetime opportunities of the awardees, something we can all be proud of. This accomplishment is tangible proof of the philanthropic spirit of AAUW-Asheville. Now GEM is at a place where we can expand the pool of women who are eligible for GEM-AAUW scholarships, award a higher number of scholarships, and increase the dollar amount of each scholarship. To this end, the GEM board made these changes:

A-B Tech

A-B tech first-year students are eligible; previously only second year students were eligible.

Students in a 2-year degree program are eligible; previously students had to be in a transfer program to a 4-year school.

The scholarship amount is \$1500, increased from \$1000.

UNC-Asheville

Priority is given to GEM scholars transferring from A-B Tech.

Next in priority are other students transferring from A-B Tech.

Scholarships are renewable for a second year to GEM scholars who attend UNCA full time and have at least 3.0 cumulative GPA.

Scholarship amount is increased to \$2000 per semester or \$4000 per academic year; previous amount was \$2000 per academic year.

The GEM board appreciates the continued support of AAUW members. A special thank you to all our AAUW members who have made possible this expansion of the scholarship program. We invite you to visit one of our board meetings, to volunteer for the GEM board, or to help with a GEM fundraising event. Please come to the next **GEM fundraiser on June 2 at Fernihurst on the A-B Tech campus**. You won't want to miss the opportunities to bid on silent auction and raffle items. The food will be great—catered by A-B Tech culinary graduates—and the company couldn't be better.


