Amy's background is in program design and development with a focus on children and families in the areas of early care and education, mental health and family support. She brings a deep understanding of organizational operations and strategic planning to her work along with a commitment to supporting children's healthy development, resilient families and strong communities.

Dr. Patterson was the speaker at the April 24<sup>th</sup> Branch Meeting and spoke to the status of Asheville school pro-

grams. She explained Magnet schools within the Asheville district and indicated that she wants children to have choices in the direction of their education. She also emphasized the need for teachers to be better supported, within the community as well as fiscally. Locally there are increases to salaries beyond the state scale. Asheville is making an effort to attract teachers to the area, with such incentives as hiring bonuses. Dr. Patterson is a speaker that keeps your attention and is able to provide clarity to sometimes more difficult topics. Perhaps the most unusual aspect of her new program is the emphasis on personalizing a child's education by incorporating the child's interest into the academic subjects. When she answered the last question and was leaving the podium, I felt like I'd enjoy experience education in the environment that she is creating! She exudes pride in her new neighborhood!



- "[In the US] a black woman with an advanced degree is more likely to lose her baby than a white woman with less than an eighth-grade education."







Dear AAUW Asheville Branch Members,

Over the yeas AAUW has changed its by-laws and again this year they have three proposed amendments before the membership for a vote.

#### The three proposed amendments are:

- Creating 3 year staggered board terms
- Opening board service to those outside of the AAUW membership
- Eliminating the degree requirement for membership

Each proposed amendment can be found on the AAUW website, <a href="https://www.aauw.org/resource/national-election/">https://www.aauw.org/resource/national-election/</a> the overarching motivation for these changes at this time is to uphold and advance AAUW's mission and ensure optimal execution at the national board level.

Some of the bylaw changes in the past have been:

- 1882 Degree from a specific list of colleges or universities
- 1949 Degree from any accredited four-year college or university
- 1987 Membership extended to male college graduates
- 2005 Membership extended to include graduates who hold an associate or equivalent degree from a qualified educational institution

The reason for these changes came about as the board asked - how many potential members are we losing because AAUW has this eligibility requirement? Could it be for women who don't meet the education requirement, or we lose women who share our vision but don't like AAUW because it seems to be an exclusive organization and do we lose donations who don't understand why you much have a college degree to work towards gender equality.

Some members object to the open membership because they are concerned that our name will be changed. AAUW is the forth name we have had in our years of being a membership organization. The name was not changed when AAUW started accepting people who had a community college degree. What we call ourselves is not the end all in their decision to become a more inclusive organization.

AAUW is an organization that fully supports women getting a college education in the field of their choice, but we need to recognize that education comes in many forms.

Over our professional lives we have worked with many women who did not have a

formal degree. This is not a measure of intelligence, sometimes it is the lack of opportunity or choices made early in life that are difficult to reverse.

If you look at the statistics, in 2016, 46% of non-Hispanic white women aged 25 to 29 years completed four years of college. For African American and Hispanic women, the numbers are more stark at 25% and 31% respectively. This suggests AAUW cannot promote equity and diversity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements.

So, the first two proposals would bring AAUW more in line with nationally accepted non-profit best practices and the needs of the organization. AAUW National board feels strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense in the beginning, this requirement is now perceived by many as counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.

At the state meeting that was held on March 24th this was brought to a vote by all in attendance and all three proposals were endorsed without any opposition.

- On June 9th Voting on line will end
- June 10th the results will be announced as to how members voted.
