Just this month, the President of NC AAUW, Jane Terwillegar, reached out to all branch leaders encouraging all branches to join the ERA-NC Alliance and endorse the AAUW NC Resolution on ERA ratification. AAUW-Asheville is proud to

At our next branch meeting, Marta Alcala-Williams will speak to us about addressing childhood trauma and providing tools for equity in the Asheville Housing Authority community. ### **Committee News**

### Advocacy/Public Policy Kitty Schaller

If you've been interested to try out the A/PP Committee but the Friday morning meeting time didn't work for you - you are in luck! Come to the **Tuesday,December 11** meeting, as we work out a new monthly meeting day & time.

The A/PP Committee meets December 11 (Tuesday) at 4:00 pm at the YWCA (185 S.French Broad St) - 2nd floor board room. We welcome the stalwart committee, the new members or those newly interested in participating in public policy action.

New rule: The A/PP Committee decoded when an important public policy concern arrises <u>that has not been previously chosen as a focus issue area</u>, we <u>will</u> call for action. Such was the case *immediately* with concerns for the sale of Mission Health Systems (the hospital) to for profit Hospital Corporation of America.

We have issued a **Public Policy Primer by email blast,** requesting AAUW members act. (Check email on 11/16 from AAUW of Asheville.)

• Write letters to the editor of our major papers: Mountain Xpress and/or Asheville Citizen Times.

Secondly, write the Attorney General Josh Stein.

In both cases, ponder the launch of the Dogwood Health Trust (DHT) that will absorb the proceeds of the hospital sale, making it the largest per capita foundation in the USA! Concerned WNC experts — near and far —urge restraint, transparency of the contract, diversity for DHT board, and caution in the formation of the Trust. With respect to the MHS/HCA contract, : slow down to review many issues, such as Why can't DHT be sued should it not conform to the contract? What steps must be taken to ensure the hospital's relationship with MAHEC for graduate medical education? Can we set a date certain, before which the rural hospitals will not close? And so many other questions.

• Speakers in recent meetings have warned, the decisions that are "being made these days will will outlive us all — long after our names are forgotten." This web of needs and decisions will affect our WNC residents for many generations to come. Let's help get right! AAUW has the concern — and the clout — let's use it. Also, a newly elected NC legislature may portend some action on our other policy areas: early ed, gerrymandering, ERA, and healthcare access.

#### **Results of October Branch Meeting Group Participation**

The members of the AAUW Public Policy and Advocacy Committee so appreciate your participation and response to the October Branch meeting. We knew in our hearts that advocacy was important to many of our fellow AAU-Wers and you proved it with your enthusiastic discussion, thoughtful responses to the information cards and demonstrated willingness to do your advocacy part. Sitting together made for a lively social time as well.

We tallied the response cards (33+) and noted the following: *Almost twothirds of you listed healthcare and access to healthcare, voting rights and gerrymandering, and ERA passage as your top three concerns.* That's significant and will play a primary role in the PPA Committee's activities this coming year. Further, *two-thirds of you are willing to engage in one-time or one-task specific activities on behalf of those priorities.* Seven of you are willing to serve on the committee (THANK YOU) and 17 of you have or will sign up to be Two-Minute Activists at the national level. We are inspired and encouraged with the support you offer and plan to take you up on it when the occasion calls for it. We've already sent out two calls to action. Please open them and pass them on.

In fact, because the healthcare issue (Mission Health sale to HCA) is of paramount importance to all of western North Carolina over the next few weeks, we will be sending out updates and calls to action when really necessary and when a swift, active response on your part will carry the most import. That's when we are counting on you to click open the call email and ACT. Meanwhile, the Public Policy and Advocacy Committee continues its pursuit of educating, responding, promoting and calling on you as we support the national and local policy agendas.
