We talked to restaurants, churches, businesses, friends, and lots of people in the know. We discovered that tourist prices, rental fees and food costs have increased significantly and caused some sticker shock. BUT...

Would you believe that **Goodwill** has a beautifully equipped, spacious room with really comfortable chairs, with an attached kitchen and ample parking, all free of charge? We are thrilled and relieved to know that we will all be gathering in this well-appointed place for our branch meetings. It is located at **1616 Patton Avenue**, central for our north, east, west and south members to access. Barb and I drove from Weaverville to the Goodwill in 22 minutes! Since we meet in the middle of the day, we avoid the busier traffic times and potential delays. With our Zip Code groups in place, you might decide to carpool, too.

If you have never ventured into this particular Goodwill, the meeting building is the one on the left, **the Career Center**. Advocacy & Public Policy Committee Report

The A/PP held its first committee meeting of the year on August14 with three attendees. We anticipate a *plethora* of attendees at the next scheduled meeting on **September 11 at the YWCA**, 2nd floor conference room. **Will you be there?** If advocacy for equity is a primary purpose for AAUW's existence, then how can we engage you in making that a vibrant, active, viable component of our local branch? Come to our next meeting and engage with us in planning and creating acts of advocacy this year.

Our issue areas are on the hot burner this fall and throughout the year. The ERA is receiving a huge push in North Carolina to advocate our state as #38, THE one to push us over the ratification requirement and make equal rights under the law a reality. We'll have lots of short-term activities to pursue in conjunction with the ERA-NC Coalition. Are you talking to your friends in other counties and encouraging them to contact their legislators?

Medicaid Expansion through the Governor's budget negotiations could actually happen so stay tuned to how you can impact that decision. Fair Vote is winding its way through the NC Supreme Court and may actually create an avenue for re-arranging voting boundaries. These all will require our advocacy with our state legislators, with our friends in other districts, with our Letters to the Editor of our newspapers and our gently vocal encouragement for opportunities for everyone.

We do have a significant idea for our committee in creating a forum that focuses on the progress for Early Childhood Education in our greater community. Our thoughts so far:

Invite the entire AAUW membership, League of Women Voters, and the general public

Focus on the huge turnaround at the County Commission which had begun to grant \$3.6 million for ECE

Emphasize the absolute necessity of shaping young lives in their first 2000 days, when the vast majority of brain development occurs

Demonstrate the terrible income disparity for ECE teachers and other factors that make it so hard to get and keep affordable slots for young children in Buncombe County

Consider solutions and begin to advocate for those solutions.

We're hoping some of you have an interest, a concern, a heart for this issue and will join us in making that forum happen.

And if that's not of interest, propose your ideas, your passion and your commitment to something we can all join in together. The possibilities are infinite, but our time together is finite. Let's make it worthwhile! Let's do it now.
