

Advocacy/Public Policy

Public policy activism is foundational to our National AAUW organization, and the national staff works tirelessly and competently to advance the AAUW agenda. In fact, we have a chance to influence that agenda, as we members can vote on it in the spring of odd-numbered years. AAUW Asheville cannot work on their entire agenda -- almost 30 areas! We are guided by the national stance, and we support their "5-minute activist" pleas that you receive by email. (If you aren't receiving them, please contact us.)

Advocacy & Public Policy members (A/PP) met on November 13 and heard a report from Robbie Madden, urging us to continue to race for NC lawmakers to ratify the ERA. Even though recent election good news in Virginia suggests strongly they are likely to become the 38th and last necessary state to ratify. NC still needs to support ERA passage to be the "39th in 2020!"

Barbara Robinson and Kitty Schaller had recently attended the Voter Assisof our taking up the cause.

The A/PP wants YOU -- as we partner with our Buncombe County Board of Election in a project to inform the public about the Voter Photo ID – that will be required for the March 3 Primary. We'll have details soon, so please be ready to join us in January for a brief training, so we can work in teams to edu- that come emailed to you — to both inform and call Branch members to accate people. This "done-in-a-day" commitment will place us in congregate residences (assisted living, condo communities and apartment buildings) or libraries and schools. The Photo ID rules are not difficult to understand nor to interpret. And most everyone will easily be able to qualify with an ID. But without plenty of voter awareness and assurance, voters will be intimidated, to Get Out The Vote.

Our Advocacy & Public Policy Committee seeks to work with other likeminded non-profits and governmental offices in Buncombe County, so we'll keep you up to date about seminars and workshops we think fit our priorities.

In addition to working with the Board of Election, we have this news: A key nonprofit partner is League of Women Voters that is super focused on public policy, especially voting. They will be bringing their wonderful women's suffrage displays to our AAUW January Branch meeting, and a League member will talk briefly about looking back as a key to LOOKING FORWARD, as we celebrate the centennial in 2020 of women getting the vote.

As we have said, Asheville AAUW A/PP has concentrated our efforts on just two issues: **ERA and Fair Voting** – though we will continue to pay attention and report on healthcare – as it has been so pivotal at our state level. ERA support seems an obvious choice, but do you ever wonder why Voting -- Or Healthcare... is considered a women's issue? We can promise you, whatever the problem our nation, state or city faces, it falls especially hard on women. Yes, poor nutrition, education, healthcare – missing human rights in general -tance training on Voter Photo ID and led a conversation about the possibilities always disadvantage women MORE. And then there are issues of abuse! So what seems to be an ISSUE is a WOMEN'S issue.

> We encourage our Branch members to inform ourselves on these pivotal issues of the day with written pieces in the Newsletter and Public Policy Primer tion. That's usually asking you to contact elected officials – timed to influence an upcoming vote. AAUW does not -- and cannot -- speak out on candidates or other partisan actions. But we are welcomed as good citizens to be public in our support of policy issues.






