READY for ACTION? A &PP has OPTIONS for YOU!

Our small but mighty committee continues to pursue avenues of ADVOCACY and promotion of PUBLIC POLICY ISSUES. Here are four to keep you "in the know."

- 1. In North Carolina, we have some current mandates around voting access that we have decided need our attention. You have all received via mail the basic information around the requirements for presenting a permissible Voter ID by the upcoming March primary. And for most of us, we can pass muster with picture IDs already in our possession. But that is not true for all Buncombe County residents. That's where YOU come in. Can you identify places and people who may need to have Voter ID pictures made and who need to receive basic information about this Voter ID business? Do you live in a collective or aggregate community or a neighborhood, attend an exercise class, participate in a volunteer capacity somewhere within Buncombe County where you could help arrange a meeting (TWO HOURS AT MOST) sponsored by AAUW who coordinates with the Board of Elections community staff to be there for questions and photos? Can you do that in January or February? Then contact Kitty or Johanna with the particulars. Last year many of you indicated that you wanted short-term, task specific activities to support our mission. This is a prime opportunity!
- 2. For those of you who would like to receive the Voter ID training so you can go out and be a personal advocate, the committee is planning such a training session in early January. Sign up with Kitty or Johanna.

- 3. Join us at our monthly meeting at the YWCA: January 8 at 11:30AM. We will feed you since it's lunchtime.
- 4. We have a special speaker lined up for the state AAUW meeting here in March and encourage all of you to attend. Rick Glaizer, the CEO of the North Carolina Justice Center, will be the featured speaker, addressing all issues of equity, health care, women's rights, and advocacy within our state. It should be an eye-opening session for all of us. March 28 at 10 AM.

One more thing: Would you be interested in viewing the ERA promoting Equal Means Equal film in the comfort of your home with a few friends? We have copies to lend out. Maybe we can actually make North Carolina the 39th state to ratify the ERA if we educate enough advocates to sway our legislators.

AAUW Asheville along with the state are sponsoring two bus trips going to Seneca Fall, NY to celebrate the 100 year anniversary of Women's Right to Vote. **The date is May 8-10, 2020.** The bus will depart Asheville at 6:00 a.m. and arrive in Richmond, VA where we will visit Maggie Walker's home and have lunch in Richmond and then continue on to Seneca Fall, NY. Arriving Friday night. On Saturday we will tour Seneca Falls home of Elizabeth Cady Stanton home, The Women's Right to Vote National Park exhibits and tour and the National Women's History Museum. Around 3:00 p.m. we will depart for Rochester, NY to tour Susan B. Anthony's home. We will spend the night in Rochester and depart on Sunday where we will stop in Gettysburg, PA to tour Jennie Wade's Home and have in Gettysburg.
