Equal Rights Amendment: ERA-NC Alliance has been busy, and Robbie Madden reported at our August meeting about their Candidate Survey. You can go to https://www.era-nc.org/on-your-ballot-who-supports-the-era/ to see who's on your ballot as US Senate & House candidates and NC Senate and House candidates and how they stand on the ERA. Please decide to support candidates who support the ERA.

<u>Census:</u> Our recent Public Policy Primer urged you to complete your census form online at <u>https://my2020census.gov/</u> For every one of us who submits this 7-minute form means \$1823 in Federal benefits to Buncombe County! But currently the return rate in our county is under 60%, and that could cost us in redistricting for Congressional and NC legislature seats. NC should gain a seat in Congress with our increased population, but not if our statewide Census returns lag behind. Tell 20 people! (Check that website to be *sure* your household's form is in.)

Voting: <u>Make a PLAN to Vote</u>. Our Buncombe Election Services staff works hard to make our polling places safe for Early Voting (Oct. 15-31) and Election Day (Nov. 3). Those are still voting options this fall. Our A/PP strongly suggests you consider Absentee Voting, especially because of COVID-19 concerns with in-person voting. A Public Policy Primer emailed Aug. 19 will provide the details you need. Remember you must submit an Absentee Ballot Request Form – do it now! When the ballot comes to your mailbox in September, you can fill it out *quickly* and mail or drop it off at Election Services 77 McDowell St. 28802. (Worries about USPS are mitigated by mailing your ballot <u>ASAP.)</u> Having an absentee ballot doesn't mean you must use it. You can save it, and If COVID-19 risks ease, you can still vote in person instead.

We're spreading the word: "Absentee Voting Community Spread Campaign: A/PP Committee has provided our materials to Buncombe County organizations, faith communities, and businesses, requesting they show the videos, distribute the flyers and forms, so thousands will consider Absentee Voting 2020. *YOU can help us do this* if you have contacts especially in "organizations or organizations," such as Chamber of Commerce or United Way. Send them now to friends and social media. Contact Kitty or Johanna or come to our meeting September 9.

ABSENTEE VOTING - NOW

What do you know about mail-in voting? The general election is **70 days away** and our committee is actively engaged in promoting how and when people can plan for their vote. We believe Voting by Mail is the safe, secure and efficient route to voting, especially in light of a continued COVID-19 threat. While the usual NC in-person voting options are still available (Early Voting 10/15-31 and Election Day 11/3), everyone can consider NC No-Excuse Absentee Voting as a great way to stay safe. It is also expedient--no waiting weeks to vote. Once your ballot arrives soon after September 4, you can complete it, follow the instructions precisely and mail it with plenty of time for the USPS to deliver it.

We feel so strongly that we've started an information campaign, along with many other organizations who share similar convictions, to disseminate far and wide the information that asks and answers basic questions and provides links to informational videos and websites. Please share this with everyone you know. And even if you think you prefer to vote in-person, consider having the insurance policy of having a mail-in ballot on hand. Here are the links you need:

CANDIDATES SURVEYED ON THEIR ERA POSITIONS

This summer several local AAUW members pitched in to conduct a survey on the Equal Rights Amendment. We mailed a letter and a stamped return postcard to every NC candidate running for the U.S. Senate, U.S. House, and NC General Assembly—nearly 400 in all. The biennial survey is a project of the ERA-NC Alliance, of which AAUW of NC is a lead organization.

With Virginia's ratification early this year, the required 38 states have now ratified the ERA. However, its certification has been delayed by lawsuits concerning the 1982 deadline. One remedy would be for Congress to pass a measure to lift the deadline, which would allow the National Archivist to certify Virginia's ratification. Legislation to do that has passed the U.S. House, but is stalled in the U.S. Senate.

We asked NC's congressional candidates, "If elected, will you cosponsor and vote for the measure to eliminate the deadline and put the Equal Rights Amendment into the US Constitution?" (One candidate sent back the postcard, unsigned, with this message: "We get our rights from God—not government!")

Regardless of action by Congress or the courts, the ERA will be introduced again in next year's NC General Assembly in an effort to make our state the 39th to ratify. We asked all 352 legislative candidates, "If elected, will you cosponsor and vote for the resolution to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment?" Most of those responding said yes.

The deadline to return the postcards was July 15, but responses continue to trickle in. Currently nearly 40 percent of the legislative candidates have responded. To see the responses, visit the Alliance website: https://www.era-nc.org/

As the philanthropic arm of AAUW Asheville, The GEM Fund is a very important part of our branch. The GEM Fund (Gaining Educational Momentum) exists to provide scholarships to local women who are enrolled at AB-Tech or UNC Asheville. Criteria for selection to receive a GEM scholarship, which is administered through the Financial Aid Offices of each school, are that only women whose education has been interrupted or delayed are considered. This current school year, The GEM Fund contributed over \$33,000, which resulted in the two schools awarding 15 scholarships. This was a milestone year as it was the first time that interest from the endowment fund was able to add \$10,000 to last year's fundraising efforts.

This summer brought another first of its kind—a "virtual" fundraiser for The GEM Fund for 2021-2022 scholarships. Due to COVID-19, we were unable to have the traditional June fundraising and scholarship recipient recognition event. Instead invitations to donate to The GEM Fund were mailed to AAUW Asheville branch members and others who have contributed in the past. Because of your largesse, over \$25,000 was raised. The GEM Fund Board, wisely using funds raised with this event and other donations, will be contributing nearly \$35,000 for the 2021-2022 scholarships. One of those "other donations" is through recognizing someone special to you on their birthday. Watch monthly for the birthday list of names and make someone's day extra special by honoring them with a GEM donation.

We are all AAAUW members, committed to the mission of advancing gender equity through research, education and advocacy. Helping support the education of women who then have the opportunity to reach some of their life goals is truly worthy of our support.
